Half-Filled Books Are Under 'Attack' By Stamp Vendors

Retailers of Michigan are making a determined effort during January and February to convert partially-filled war savings stamp books into war bonds. Their drive is part of a nationwide program directed toward that end, and inaugurated by the U. S. Treasury Department.

"There are over 100 million war savings stamp albums in the hands of American citizens, according to U. S. Treasury Department estimates," said W. L. Moreland, local chairman for the Michigan Retailers War Savings Committee. "Our Army, Navy and other armed forces desperately need the \$1,875,000,000 worth of

fighting equipment which would be provided if all partly-filled war Stamp Albums were completely filled and converted into Bonds. The retailers of Birmingham are going to help accomplish that objective this month and next. It's really a 'Clearance Sale' idea, and we urge every person who has a war stamp album which is not completely filled, to fill it up and convert it into another bond, so the money can provide more equipment for our fighting men. Further, no interest is paid on war stamps, but the minute they are converted into a bond, interest starts to accumulate.

"One of the best and quickest ways to fill those war stamp albums is to form the habit of always taking part of your change in war stamps whenever you purchase groceries, clothing, drugs, gasoline or what not. Dimes and quarters invested regularly in war savings stamps soon buy another bond."
