

### Junior High Cagers Score 2 Victories

Jenkins led the Pontiac boys with six points while Schaefer of the locals finished with ten points.

This is the first time Birmingham has defeated a Pontiac Junior High School.

The other game was a return match against Pontiac Eastern, a Birmingham win, which was their first meeting. This game was a different story, the visiting team, Birmingham, taking a large lead of 29-11 at the half and holding it throughout, finishing on top 33-26.

### U. of M. to Offer Course in Post-War Reconstruction

The University of Michigan's program of international studies, offering specialized instruction to prepare men and women for service in countries likely to be occupied or in need of assistance as a result of the war, will discuss at a meeting at 4:30 p.m. Friday, Jan. 22, room 677 in the Penobscot Building in Detroit.

Mature persons with experience or training in either law, industry, finance, public utilities, education, public health, social welfare or engineering who are willing to devote the considerable amount of time which is required by the program are urged to attend the meeting to hear Prof. Howard B. Calderwood, a member of the University faculty, explain details of the specialized instruction.

If there is sufficient interest, the university may offer a duplicate of the course as it is given on the campus. Prof. Calderwood says.

### School Cafeteria Gets Under Way

Baldwin High School's cafeteria reopened Monday, serving an average of 120 people and counting about 50 who have regularly been carrying their lunches.

Menus are posted in advance so that students may bring their own sandwiches if any cooked dish does not appeal. The usual menu includes a hot dish such as meat loaf, Spanish rice or vegetable plate, plus milk, ice cream, salad, cake and sandwiches.
