Wayne U. History Professor to Speak At Religion School

The Birmingham School of Religion opens in the First Baptist Church, corner of Willis and Bates streets, Monday, Feb. 1, at 7:30 p. m. Those who have not registered previously should arrive at 7:00 if possible. Classes will begin promptly at 7:30.

Dr. Raymond C. Miller, head of the history department at Wayne University, will make the opening presentation to the group on the subject, "John K. Ormond and the Leadership of the Group and the Plans to Urge every member of the group to participate in the discussion. This will be a very interesting group which will work on an extremely timely subject. Mrs. Ormond will cordially welcome any person in the community who wishes to join the group. The class discussing the Teachings of Jesus promises to be most interesting one. The leader, Mr. Carhart, spent part of a year in Lovetch, Bulgaria, in 1940 and this together with his background of many years experience in Y. M. C. A. work, plus his deep interest in church leaders, public school teachers, prospective camp leaders, and others interested in home recreation.

Theodore Czerkowski, leader of the group in Recreation, plans to use the clinic or laboratory method. He will present plans of recreation, the value of recreation in the development of character, games that can be used without special equipment, and then the whole class will actually play the thing they have talked about. This course should be of great interest to church leaders, public school teachers, prospective camp leaders, and others interested in home recreation.

The three methods courses will appeal particularly to teachers in church schools and to prospective teachers and also to parents of children of the different age groups. The Beginners course will have very able leadership by Mr. Ernest W. Seaborn who, in practice, has been very successful in keeping the small children interested in religious education. "Ways of teaching" will appeal to teachers and parents of all age groups and the Rev. Joseph O. Nelson will be a very stimulating speaker on the subject of "Building and Administering a Total Youth Program" under Miss Julia Kagen, should prove to be of great value to leaders of young people. Miss Kagen has a rich background of experience and training.
