

U-M Scholarship Applications Now Are Being Taken

"Applications of candidates for the undergraduate scholarship at the University of Michigan are now being accepted," Mrs. Lee A. White, head of the University of Michigan scholarship committee for Birmingham, stated Monday. "Applicants must be in the upper fifth of their class and they must present proof to the committee of character, ability in general activities and financial need," she added.

The scholarship provides the tuition of a student regardless of the department he chooses to attend. It may start with the summer term of the accelerated college program or it may begin with the fall term.

The scholarship committee, including Mrs. White, Mrs. Charles E. Lewis, Mrs. Robert A. Kinson, Mrs. Max M. Tunnicliffe, and Mrs. Lawrence E. Smith, sift out the applicants and choose three outstanding prospects who are given a competitive examination by the University. The scholarship is awarded according to the grades made on this test.

Students from Birmingham now at Michigan who have benefited from this scholarship are Joan Hadjisky and Alice Bronson, freshmen; Robert Peck and Marietta Krzej, sophomores; Richard Harvey, junior; and Eleanor Kelly, senior.

Proceeds from the University alumnae benefit luncheon held today will go to the scholarship fund which provides any additional needs of the scholarship holders.

Consumer News Let's All Help!

POINT RATIONING
"Increasing emphasis is being placed on the education of the public in 'point' rationing before it goes into effect with the issuing of War Ration Book No. 2," according to Mrs. Cassius L. Miller, recently appointed Consumer Interest Chairman of the Birmingham Defense Council.

An Additional Kind of "Money"
"This system," says Mrs. Miller, "goes beyond the simple unit coupon system in use at present for sugar, coffee, gasoline and fuel oil, and other commodities. It is used for a definite amount of a definite commodity. Under this rationing system the ration coupons will have in effect an additional kind of money to handle when we go to market."

Advance Education Used
"In order to avoid confusion in inaugurating this new system, the Office of Price Administration is urging all housewives to educate themselves in advance for buying under this plan.

"The first thing to be rationed under the new system will be commercially processed fruits and vegetables. It has been suggested that the best way to prepare for the rationing of these commodities is to keep a careful record of purchases and amount used for the next few weeks. By this means, when rationing does start, it will be possible to budget the family meals according to the points available for use, working with this record of recent experience."

"There is no question but that careful planning and budgeting of 'point' coupons will be necessary as the supply of goods which are designed to ration has been drastically cut, due to the requirements of our armed forces and of our fighting allies. The 'point' value of the coupons has not yet been determined, nor has the 'point' cost of the various rationed commodities. The latter will be announced in advance, and will be displayed on official posters in each store. The issue in terms of 'points' will be determined by the supply of each commodity; the scarcer the item the higher its 'point' value."

Duty to Family and to Merchant
Mrs. Miller points out that there is a double duty involved for each housewife in order to learn all she can about this system before it goes into effect, first, for the sake of her own family, and second, for the sake of her merchant, who will be hard pressed with the additional amount of work involved. She also will have to make two sets of computations for each sale, the price in dollars and cents, and the 'point' worth of coupons which the customer will have to give up in addition to the money.

Because this "point" rationing is scheduled to begin within the next few weeks, it will be especially fortunate for the Birmingham housewives who were able to attend the School for Wartime Living held yesterday, that there was included on its program a discussion on this rationing method and how to buy under it.

Volunteers Needed
Volunteer workers to help inform the public of this new rationing program will be needed. Mrs. Miller asks that any persons who are willing to take part in this educational work call her at Birmingham 2988.
