

### Wabek Pharmacy Undergoes Change

The Wabek Pharmacy is undergoing a remodeling process this week and when it is finished the store will feature one of the finest and most modern prescription departments to be found in any drug store, according to Mark B. Bearse, proprietor.

The Bates street entrance has been moved up toward the front approximately eight feet; the extra space will be utilized in making the prescription department considerably larger than previously. The room will feature the most modern type of Swartz System fixtures, including rows of specially constructed drug cabinets, designed for use in drug stores on the east and north sides of the room, and the prescription desk will be on the west side. Toward the front, overlooking the rest of

the store will be a glassed-in front with a modern design.

The drawers in the new cabinets will have adjustable shelves to accommodate any size container one might want to put in them. The exterior of the drawers and fixtures will be pure white, according to Mr. Bearse. Another fine feature of this new drawer space is the fact that all drugs and medicines will now be out of the light which is extremely harmful to some of them, he said.

Was it because, as a dentist, I had been guilty of stuffing various gadgets into people's mouths, and then expected them to carry on a conversation? Was it because, on several occasions, I had relieved the aching teeth of certain people who should have had aching teeth a few minutes longer than they did, and I could see the fact that I was still a user of worms, occasionally, in trout fishing—although I was using a dry fly? The mine, two feet in diameter and more than eight feet long, and loaded with high explosive, was to have been flown to the Bay of Biscay on that fateful June 22, 1942. However, shortly after take-off, the aircraft caught fire, before any could escape, the ship crashed.

"The last I remember, the plane was at 400 feet and falling," Hiley said. "All I know of what happened after that is what people told me. I was unconscious for two days."

As the plane hit the ground, there was a huge explosion, of course, and here is where the miracle comes in: Hiley was blown 350 feet away, but suffered only a broken ankle and severe burns. The three others of the crew were killed instantly. There was severe shock, of course, and Hiley still has not recovered his full strength.

### Explains Escape

"How do you explain your escape," he was asked.

"The only solution I can see," Hiley answered, "is that I was saved by a piece of armor plate which lay between me and the mine. That must have broken the force of the explosion."

It was just before Christmas that Pilot Officer Hiley and other heroes were called to Buckingham Palace to meet the King, who was much interested in Hiley's adventure.

Hiley had other interesting trips, of course. One "experiment" was that of shooting up a train using a bomber (the lighter planes are usually employed). Intelligence reported that at a certain time, a munitions train would pass between two German towns, and sure enough, it did. Hiley first stopped the train by filling the engine with armor-piercing slugs from his machine guns, and then dropped a stick of bombs from low level, blowing the train sky-high.

### Enjoyed Blasting Train

"I really enjoyed that," Hiley said. "You were low enough to see just what you were doing."

The eight-thousand-pound blockbuster bombs are really terrific, Hiley recalled. He remembers seeing the roof of one building blown a mile into the air, and even at 7,000 or 8,000 feet, the concussion is so great that a plane may be flipped over on its back.

Hiley expects to be put to work as an instructor as soon as his leave expires. He wears civilian clothes, for RCAF rules, unlike ours, permit an officer to change to civvies when on extended leave.
