Two hundred and twenty-five women are now qualified canteen workers in Oakland County. They are active in packing lunches for inductees, serving at Red Cross blood donor stations, and also prepare a luncheon once each month for the meeting of the Red Cross executive committee.

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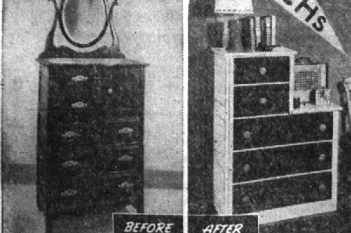
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
