Indiana University
BLOOMINGTON, Ind.—Dorothea L. Lansing of Birmingham has registered for the summer semester at Indiana University. These students as enrolled for the first half of the semester help make up a civilian student body which still dominates the campus scene at I. U. in spite of the large military personnel in training at the University. Though recognizing the obligation to give as much military training as possible, University officials are emphatic in their assertion that adequate instructional and living facilities will be reserved for civilian students throughout the war period.

Seek Officers For Wac Duty
With the recent announcement that the lid is off the quota for Wac recruitment comes the realization that more officers will be needed in the corps. Establishment of a Wac officer candidate training program in which applicants will be selected for direct entry from civilian life has been announced by Major General S. S. Auzand, Commanding Sixth Service Command.

Qualifications which will govern the selection of candidates in addition to general Wac enrollment requirements are:
1. Age Limit: From 21st birthday inclusive, to 50th birthday, exclusive.
2. Education and Experience: At least four years of experience beyond the high school level in work, study, social, or civic fields entailing responsibility, initiative, resourcefulness and other qualifications of leadership. This experience should show successful accomplishment in one or more positions of responsibility and supervision. Successful completion of one or more of the following: a) in which the applicant has demonstrated the qualities listed above, b) taken as equivalent to the same number of years of the experience above described.

3. Personal Characteristics: The ideal candidate will have in high degree the ability to work easily and effectively with others. She will have emotional stability and will be able to adapt herself quickly and easily to changing conditions. She will be able to subordinate personal views and interests to the welfare of the whole. All accepted applicants will undergo basic training (4 weeks) and auxiliary training (8 weeks) at the auxiliary rate of pay which is \$50 a month. After commissioning, they will receive the regular Army rate of pay for officers. Applicants are needed to fill the following positions: command officers, executive and staff officers, and operational officers. Under the latter classification special skill in a definite field will be required, such as public relations, photography, food management, public speaking, communications, etc. Application should be made at 2085 East Jefferson, in Detroit.

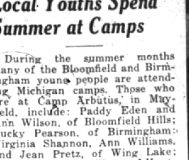

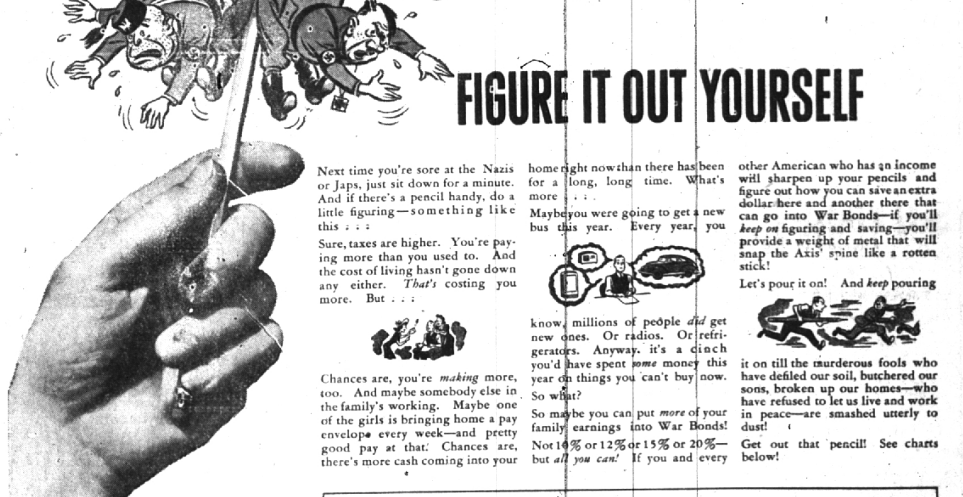
