Yet Washington, in high places, continues to give the country poor examples of leadership.

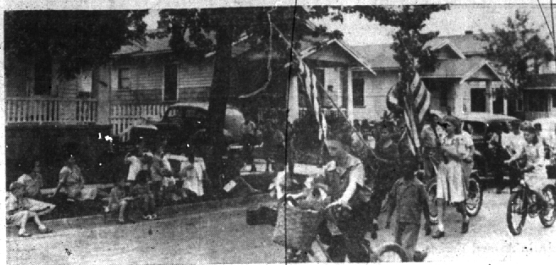
We will win the war, of course; but the impact of poor leadership during this war certainly doesn't raise the quality of government at home; nor does it improve the quality of citizenship.
