## Volunteer Workers Of Red Cross Give Half Million Hours

Volunteer workers of Oakland County have donated nearly 1/2 million hours during the past year towards raising money in time of distress, but throughout the year, members have provided meals and refreshments at the Blood Bank as well as box lunches for inductees.

Supplying drivers for army cars at Selfield field, transporting Army trucks, driving student pilots, chaplain staff members, nursing school children, and blood donors; and delivering sewing, knitting and surgical supplies to workrooms are a few of the many activities of the Red Cross. Three hundred and two corps members in the county have contributed 93,217 hours, made 24,486 trips and driven a total of 140,844 miles. 48,237 hours and almost each aide is required to donate only 150 hours per year, members of the first class averaged 215 hours per annum.
