Of a sudden, we want a good book; something really to set the teeth into. Like the girl in "Seventeen," one could always start Gibbon's "Decline and Fall"—but the list of new books at Baldwin Library looks a little more inviting.

U. S. Foreign Policy, by Walter

Lippmann. A challenging and timely book, making a strong plea for some definite American policy of foreign relations. The author shows how lack of such a policy may influence the course of world history in the near future, and how well it has affected it in the past, as well as the internal life of the nation.

What You Should Know About Spies and Saboteurs, by Will Irwin. A comprehensive picture of espionage during war time. Includes an explanation of how spies work, how they communicate with other countries, and what the ordinary citizen can do toward hindering their work.

Between the Thunder and the Sun, by Vincent Sheean. A vivid picture of present day events by the correspondent who always managed to be on the spot when trouble was brewing.

My War With Japan, by Carroll

Alcott. The absorbing story of a radio broadcaster's one-man war with Japan.

The Union of South Africa, by Lewis Sowden. A well written description of South Africa and of its leader, Jan Smuts.

These Mysterious Rays, by Allan Hays. Clear, non-technical discussion of X-rays, ultra violet and radium; what they can do and how they are being used in medicine and for diagnosis. Written for the layman.

Trees and Testubes, by Charles Wilson. The story of rubber, from the dramatic days of its discovery, down to the present.

Your House: Its Upkeep and Rejuvenation, by J. H. Hawkins. How to do the hundred and one small repair jobs about a house.

How to Write, by Stephen Leacock. Wonderful even if you don't learn to write! For the general

reader. A chapter on how to swear in print.

Lunching and Dining at Home, by Jeanne Owen. A diverting "different" cook book emphasizing home entertaining. Included are innumerable tricks of seasoning, and serving that should lend excitement to preparing even present day station-widened meals.

Does Your Child Obey? by Regina Wieman. Sane written book on children for parents and educators alike.

RECIPE OF THE WEEK
The following recipe makes a good summer main dish—

Vegetable Sausage Salad
1 quart sliced cooked potatoes, 5 cups cubed salami or Thuringer sausage, 2 tablespoons vinegar, 2 cups cooked large peas, 1 cup chopped celery, 1 pint, chopped, 6 sweet pickles, sliced, 2 hard-boiled eggs, sliced, Mayonnaise, Salt.

Mix all ingredients together, adding enough mayonnaise to moisten, salt to taste and extra vinegar if desired. Heap in large wooden bowl lined with crisp lettuce and garnish with whole pickled beets, and slices of hard-boiled eggs. Serves 6.
