Garden Contest Extended to July 1

Howard Estes, chairman of the Victory Garden Contest Committee, says that many Birmingham gardens have been registered, but he hopes many more will be added to the list before the deadline, which has been extended to July 1. Mr. Estes believes that some of the local gardeners will win County and State prizes in addition to City prizes.

Those who were lucky enough to get their planting done early have very promising looking gardens and some are already enjoying their first fresh-from-the-garden radishes, onions, and lettuce. However, other gardeners which are still unplanted have an equal chance of yielding these vegetables for the table later in the summer and all the late vegetable crops for canning and storing. It is food for next winter that we are most eager to produce and we still have the opportunity to do that.

Peas are the one vegetable only on optimistic would plant now, but the pea seed can be stored in a cool, dry place in an airtight container and saved for next year. All other crops, according to Paul E. Krone, State Victory Garden Chief, can still be planted successfully. Carrots and beets can be planted until June 15, potatoes and tomatoes until June 20, snap beans, broccoli and cauliflower, until June 25, and turnips and rutabagas until July 4.

If the most important member (to you) of the armed forces sends you a grass skirt or a parka, you probably have a pretty good idea where he is. So you telephone Baldwin Library to find out if there is any book about that particular section of the world. In many cases there is. Here are some of the newer ones:

Short Cut to Tokyo, by Corey Ford. The Aleutian Islands and your letter-writer might see them; the people, climate and a good deal concerning their strategic importance.

Alaska Under Arms, by Jean Potter. A well rounded picture of the enormous territory suddenly catapulted into world prominence.

Africa, Facts and Forecasts, by Albert Q. Maisel. Unusually sane picture of Africa from the political point of view.

North Africa, by Alan Broderick. Morocco, Algeria, Tunisia and Libya are described separately in this compact handbook.

Travels in Afghanistan, by Ernest Fox. He covered this wild land north of Khyber Pass, while prospecting for oil in 1937. His descriptions of the country and its people make good reading.

The Battle for Buenos Aires, by Scott Bradford. Changing Argentina, the Nazi infiltration and its effect on the country's place in world affairs.

Balony Empire, by Reynolds Packard. Written from first hand experience, this is a picture of Italy under conditions of a war exceedingly unpopular with the people.

Italy From Within, by Richard Massock. Told by an American correspondent, this is the story of the rise of Mussolini's fascist regime and its present precarious state.

Land of New World Neighbors, by Hans Christian Adamson. Concerning the countries of Central and South America and their place in world affairs.

Journey Among Warriors, by Eric Currie. By none-too-safe journey around the world, the author managed to visit most of the battle areas of the world. She talked with leaders and workers from China to Russia and presents a fascinating picture of the peoples of the world at war.

The Russians, by Albert Williams. The author attempts to explain why the Russians are fighting in terms of their history, their institutions and ideas.
