Requirements for both branches of the service are:  
United States citizenship; age—between 20 and 36; height—at least five feet; weight—at least 95 pounds; education—two years of high school or business school.

**Starts at 10:30 a. m.**  
Shortly after 10:30 a. m. cars began showing up at the sign of a garden. Dr. and Mrs. Roehm had an address on the tour list. Each hostess greeted her guests in her garden and graciously discussed special plants and blooms, explaining their cultivation and care in order to bring best results.

Mrs. R. D. Baker, whose garden at 648 Southfield road has been her hobby for the past 20 years, said raising pinks was an easy matter as she discussed her new phlox bed of sturdy plants. The distinctive feature of her garden is its natural setting. Over a rustic railing encircling the head of a natural spring, vines and graceful shrubs grow while rock plants are used along the drop as the spring flows in a small stream down the sweeping slope of three acres which are heavily wooded at the edges. Good garden stands in a hollow at the base of the spring.

Hundreds of peonies, iris, roses, and other plants are arranged in the open spaces. Lurking in the shade of tall trees are jack-in-the-pulpit.

**Liveable Spot**  
The garden at the home of Mrs. Charles F. Dye, 581 Lake Park drive, is a most livable spot with its double red brick grill, picnic tables and benches placed at one end of the garden in a shelter of lovely pines, hedges, and blooming shrubs. On the rising hillside which forms the garden background, are many rock plants, myrtle, and varieties of sedum which have been cleverly used among the plants in weaving the whole garden picture. The vista is a main charm of this garden. On a rising bit of ground behind the hill plot, is a large white trellis seat flanked by tall spruce. Mrs. Dye's rhododendron along the drive and her espalier tree which grows up a white brick chimney at the side of the house are her pet garden possessions.

**Plant Exchange**  
In Mrs. E. E. Anderson's garden, at 321 Yarrowood road, stand dozens of the finest specimens of evergreens. The garden is laid out on intriguing lines and bordered with hundreds of plants. Mrs. Anderson's hobby is gladioli and she now has a thousand corms ready to plant.

Guests toured the grounds which are beautifully landscaped and later, viewed many of the heirloom antiques in the home.

**Flowering trees and shrubs** growing among fine specimens of blue spruce surround the bright garden at the W. A. E. John home on Tooting lane. Columbine, sweet william, day lilies, and peonies in several colors presented a festive garden picture. At the edge of this lovely garden stands a unique guest house which is cleverly arranged inside and surrounded by pines and shrubs.

**Trimmed Hedge**  
Visitors at the garden of Mrs. Atwood B. Outman, at 227 Pilgrim road, walked through a perfectly trimmed hedge to the badminton court which adds to the liveliness of the garden. Tiny potted plants at the base of the bird bath forms an interesting detail of this neatly arranged garden.
