Drydock Follows out in the Pacific ocean the United Battleships
States Navy had no repair bases in the South Pacific and consist thousand miles from their bases.
This disadvantage its heing overcome by the construction of huge floating drydocks, unlike anything that the world has seen before. Rear Admiral Ben Moreel, Navy Engineering Chief, says that three, under construction, will handle hattleships, lifting up to 100,000 tons.

An ingenious design permits the control of the part of the part

An ingenious design permits the construction of the drydocks in sections, each a complete unit. Ten sections will take care of a battleship, seven handle heavy cruisers, the leaser units can be assembled for smaller ships. Floating machine shops will be ready to go along with the leviathans.

The original design for a battleship repair drydock had to be discarded because it was too large to go through the Panama Canal locks. Then the sectional type was devised, with each section having living space inside water-tight hulls for the crews. Each section can be towed and self propulsion machinery can be added if priorities permit.

With 1831 new docks planned, including the floating and stationary types, the Navy expense to need them. The program involves an expenditure of more than \$500,000,000 but as Admiral Morcel points out, the "cheapest and quickest way to build a ship is to repair one already built."
