## League Works for Anti-Poll Tax Bill

The Women's International League, local branch, held its annual meeting and spring luncheon in the home of chairman Mrs. J. J. Gaffill, of Hill Top lane, on Saturday afternoon. Delegates from the national meeting in New York gave reports and Mrs. Joshua Picou, of Detroit and Peru, reported on the recent Caribbean conference. A member of the former German branch of the League gave an interesting talk on her experiences in that country from which she and her daughter have recently escaped. Mrs. George T. Hendrie of Birmingham, chairman of the Michigan League, presided at the meeting in which work was discussed to aid in the passing of the anti-poll tax bill before Congress. Congratulations were also offered the government's program of relocation of American-born Japanese. Although the organization considers the poll tax bill of greatest importance, other subjects discussed are freedom for India, racial problems, and world government.
