

College Will Test Gages on Cookers

As a wartime service to Michigan housewives, the Agricultural Engineering department at Michigan State College offers to test pressure cooker gages so that home food processing will be safe, lead to less spoilage and produce a better quality of food reserve.

Pressure cooker gages have valves reading in pounds of steam pressure. Through corrosion or "leakage" the needle sometimes reads too high or too low. Pressures too low confuse the cook, often lead to food poisoning, and pressures too high, caused by gages reading too low, result in over-cooking, destroying the quality of the product.

Gages to be tested should be removed carefully from the cooker cover. If the threads appear to be

RATIONING AT A GLANCE

PROCESSED FOODS

Blue stamps K, L and M good through July 7.

CANNED FISH, CANNED MILK

Red stamps J, K, L, M and good now.

COFFEE

Stamp 21 good for 1 pound through June 30.

SUGAR

Stamp 13 good for 5 pounds through Aug. 1.

Stamp 15 and 16 good for 5 pounds canned sugar each.

RATIONED SHOES

Stamp 1 good for pair through October 31.

GASOLINE

No. 6 coupons in a Book good through July 21. B and stamps good as noted on book.

TIRES

Next inspection due: A book vehicles by Sept. 20. B by June 20. C by Aug. 31. commercial vehicles every 6 months of 5,000 miles, whichever is first.

FUEL OIL

Consumption 5 gallons for 11 gallons. It must last until Sept. 30 for both heat and hot water. Recurrent applications now being mailed to users. Fill out and return to board immediately.
