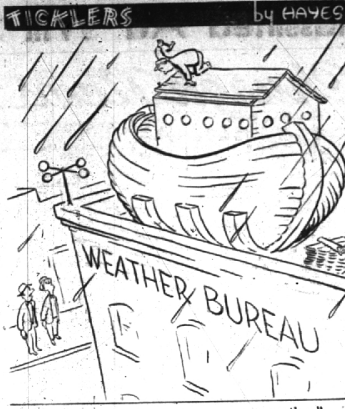
Funeral services were held Wednesday afternoon from the Bell Funeral home with Dr. W. Glen Harris officiating. Burial was in White Chapel.

**Let's All Eat Breakfast**  
The neglected breakfast is one of America's national habits—now that we are all engaged in winning the war it is a national tragedy. To maintain health and energy for work on the home front we need three meals a day. So let's get our breakfast habit right now.

A good breakfast is more important than that extra five minutes of sleep.

The very word breakfast explains its importance—breakfast. When you sit down to the breakfast table you've gone without food for at least 12 hours... every part of your body is clamoring for a fresh supply of working material with which to start the day.

**What is a Good Breakfast?**  
Fruit  
Cereal—whole-grain or restored with milk  
Bread or toast—whole-grain or enriched  
Butter or fortified Margarine  
Milk for children—Coffee if desired or if you have it for adults.

If this seems too much omit the bread or the cereal but be sure you get at least one pint of milk. An adult should have at least one pint a day. Children need a quart of milk each day.

If this breakfast seems light for the work you are doing, add an egg or a part of your share of the meat, or potatoes.

### Kingswood Grants Are Available

Kingswood School Cranbrook announces that applications for a limited number of being made and day scholarships for the 1943-44 school year will be received at the school through April 6.
