A Congressional Resolution, adopted on Dec. 22, 1942, changes the procedure for pledging allegiance to the flag. The statement: "I pledge allegiance—" is now rendered by standing with the right hand over the heart. The resolution adds "... civilians will always show full respect to the flag when the pledge is given by merely standing at attention, men removing the hats."

Adopt Plan to End Pirating of Labor

PONTIAC—Adoption of an employment stabilization plan for the Pontiac area was announced today by M. A. Clark, district director for the War Manpower Commission. The plan is effective immediately. The area consists of all of Oakland county, except the townships of Royal Oak and Southfield. The plan, developed by the Pontiac W.M.C. committee is designed to promote the orderly recruitment and transfer of workers, prevent labor piracy, reduce turn-over and efficient utilization of manpower. The committee is composed of four representatives of union organizations and four representatives of local management. Under the plan, employers will refuse to hire or solicit workers from other essential industries within the area unless the applicant presents a statement of availability from his former employer, or from the United States Employment Service.
