

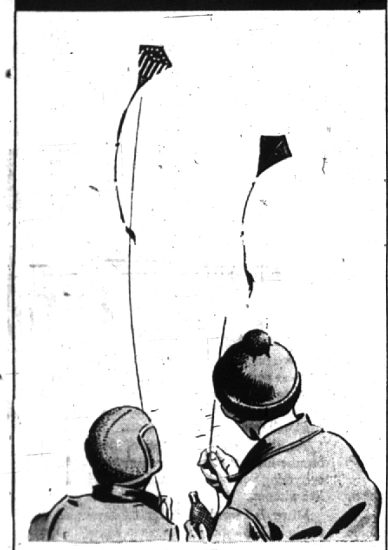

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WHEN YOU FLY KITES, PLAY SAFE—THIS WAY

SPRING WEATHER brings out kites, of course. It's fun to fly them—but be sure to see that it's done safely! When the youngsters go out with kites, see that these safety rules are observed for the children's sake:

Fly kites only in the open fields, entirely away from any electric line. This is safer for the kite, too; it doesn't get tangled with wires and lost or broken.

String containing metal (such as Christmas tinsel cord) should not be used. If it should come in contact with an electric line, serious injury might result. Even plain cotton cord conducts electricity when wet, so don't allow kite-flying during a rain. String that has fallen into puddles should be well dried out before use. Don't use metal frames in kites.

A live wire looks like any other wire. It may not be an electric line, but another wire carrying electricity can charge it by touching it some place that you cannot see. So teach children to stay clear of any wires while flying kites.

Kite flying is fun—and it's safe, when you're careful.

ENLISTMENT POSSIBLE
Voluntary enlistment may still be made in the Navy's Seabees, (Construction Battalions), by men outside Selective Service age limits, according to Lieut. R. G. Buller, Civil Engineer Corps, in charge of Seabee personnel procurement in this area. Men 38 to 50 may obtain petty officer ratings paying up to \$88.70 per month, plus keep, immediately upon enlistment. Seventeen-year-old men, also, may receive above minimum ratings by joining the Seabees. There is a Navy office at the Royal Oak post office.
