After talking with several housewives in Birmingham, it is apparent that they are not having very much trouble with point rationing. Most of them are saving fresh vegetables and find that they have ample stamps for their needs.

Mrs. Bruce R. Theriault of Puritan road, says she has several stamps left. "The can rationing has not affected me much because I have saved mostly fresh vegetables before anyway," she declares. With her husband in the Army, she says it makes a difference just feeding herself and her two children.

Eat More Vegetables

Mrs. L. A. Parubiar, of Lake Park drive, is equally unperturbed. She thinks it's a good thing because people will have to eat vitamin-rich vegetables now and it is fun to find of different ways of serving them.

She finds that her three children are getting just as many nutritious foods as before. Their needs will be supplemented by the victory garden they are planning to grow this spring.

Mrs. E. G. Szabo, of Hawthorne road, has eight in her home to feed and find it no hardship. She doesn't think, however, that some adjustment should be made on babies shoes. Her 16-month-old daughter outgrows more than three pairs a year.

The Szabos are also starting a Victory garden. "It will all be an excuse to get out in the country," Mrs. Szabo says.

Don't Save Points

Mrs. Ralph L. Beckenbaugh, of Brookwood class, conducts a nutrition class and is in direct contact with the rationing set-up and the buying program of housewives. She says, "Some women are saving up their points to stock up on canned goods at the end of the month which is just what the government doesn't want us to do."

She urges women to study the ration charts and plan out the points for each meal before going to the store as it will help the hurried grocer in his ever-increasing difficulties.

She also urges women to use more frozen vegetables as the stocks are not as depleted as fresh vegetable stocks are becoming. She thinks some adjustment on lowering the points of frozen vegetables should be made to enable the dealers to get them off their hands.

March Stamp Expire

Mrs. Milton F. Mallerud, who is head of the nutrition instruction program, says that she is afraid housewives and grocery clerks are misinformed regarding the use of

March stamps in April. No March coupons can be used after March 31.

Mrs. Mallerud also urges women to plan their buying and budgeting for the month or two ahead of time. She says that you can get more for your money in vitamins and nutritious value in frozen vegetables.

"As a whole," she adds, "the point rationing system is fair and equal especially after the announced adjustment on dried fruits is made."
