

### Although Off-Pace, Baldwin Defeats Redford Union '5'

Although decidedly off-form, a superior Birmingham High School basketball team took its way to a 43-22 victory over an outclassed but hard fighting opponent Friday evening.

The Birmingham boys were in there, tossing shots at the twines from the start, and although missing many tries, managed to pile up 14 points in the initial period. During this quarter the Redford cagers were held to four markers. The Maples managed to sink four more baskets in the second period while holding the Panthers to a lone point. At half time the score stood 22-5.

Coach Ernest Engel sent his second five in at the start of the second half and the teams seemed more evenly matched as the Redford boys suddenly came to life, making ten points while the Maples were hitting the loops for eight.

Holding a 28-15 lead, the maroon first team took the floor at the start of the last period and got 15 more points. The Panthers collected seven takers.

It was apparent from the first that the Birmingham team was off-form as the ball handling was not at its best and many shots were missed.

Dick Hopkins did a yarmouklike job for the Maples, marking up 12 points, and Fred Zeolin played an outstanding defensive game. Neil West was the leading scorer for Redford Unguns with seven points.

The Birmingham starting lineup was Murray and Peterson at forwards; Hopkins, center; Wright and Zeolin at guards.

The starters for Redford Union were West and Rokoszewski at forwards; Hartgrove, center; and Pearce and McEwen, guards.
