Recreation Board Ordinance

ORDINANCE NUMBER 288 City of Birmingham AN ORDINANCE CREATING A PUBLIC RECREATION BOARD AND CONFIRMING ITS POWERS AND DUTIES.

Section 1. The City of Birmingham Ordinance No. 288, passed at a public hearing, a public reception and public reading, and which has been approved by the Mayor and confirmed by the City Commission, is hereby amended to read as follows: Section 1. The City of Birmingham shall designate as least two (2) members of the Recreation Board, one of whom shall be a resident of the City of Birmingham, and the other shall be a resident of the City of Birmingham, and the City Manager shall be a member of the Board.

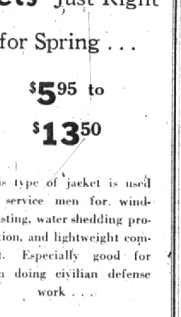
