Birmingham has received honorable mention for no pedestrian fatalities in 1942 in a national contest sponsored by the American Automobile Association. In a letter to Mayor John E. Martin, Thomas P. Henry, president of the AAA, pointed out that two-thirds of all traffic fatalities in cities are in the pedestrian group.
