Cranbrook News

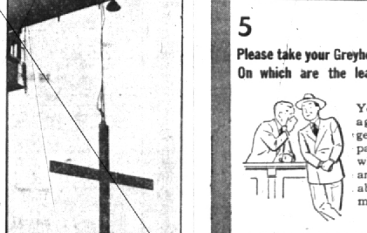
By ROBERT WILSON H. V. Davis, head of the school mathematics department, left Cranbrook last Thursday evening to report for active duty in the United States Army.
