### Rev. Forsyth Hits 'Group Morality'

The Rev. Warner L. Forsyth, rector of St. James Episcopal Church, told Rotarians Monday night at the Community House that "unless the interdenominational differences of groups within the United States temper their strong language, one against the other, we can resolve our animities and alien nations after this war is won, yet find ourselves domestically bound by class hatreds and unrest."

Mr. Forsyth stressed the natural law that one's present attitude, if good, will produce a better future. If the opposite, it will result in something accursed. "One of the underlying reasons for this widespread social confusion is the loss of personal standards of measurement," he stated. "Too many people have lost personal codes of ethics, of high values. Instead, we have tried to substitute a sort of abstract code of morality, which is morality in name only; as a group we permit types of action that are in fact immoral."

"The speaker told his audience that America appears to have lost the sense of being a national family. Capital arrays itself against labor, and vice versa; capital wars among its own kind, and present evidence shows that labor is doing the same thing. "It is easier to resolve our differences at a distance than to resolve them right at home," he declared. "My solution to much of the world's trouble is the acceptance by each individual of right and good attitudes, and the necessary application of these attitudes to his everyday, everywhere, contacts with the world of people about him."

It was pointed out that having 14 local women each day sit in booths was not bringing enough results to warrant continuation. So many local women, representatives of cooperating organizations here, are engaged in endeavors brought on by the war, that sometimes 75 women have to be called before a 14 can be obtained.

So the P.T.A. Council passed a resolution that "we confine our efforts in selling war bonds and stamps within the schools through pupils who will contact their parents." The Council will continue the booth sales for another two weeks. They also believe that sales through local banking institutions building and loan associations and the theatres, plus periodic community-wide campaigns by volunteer citizens, will keep this area up to its current war bond and stamp quotas.
