Once more the chance has come for the Birmingham tracksters to try where their great Birmingham track teams have failed. That is to say on the Twin Valley Activities Association Meet.

This meet to be held at Ypsilanti, Mich., on June 10, has proved a jinx in years gone by, not from the standpoint of any team's being better than the Maple Leaf, but because injuries have hampered Birmingham. Proof of this lies in the fact that last year Birmingham was beaten by Dearborn by one-half point due to the loss of Peterson, Kaarberg, an Armstrong, and a Wrough Bless and injuries, although Birmingham had defeated this team previously in a triangular meet.

In 1941, Birmingham was nose out by three-fifths of a point by the same school.
