than was dreamed of when we first began talking "Victory Gardens." If there was a need for you to plant a Victory Garden then, the need to plant one is manifold now.

Later Crops Possible

It is true that the hope for very early spring gardens is practically void. However, the late fall crops, carrots, beets, rutabagas, potatoes, kale, cabbage, beans, etc. are more important—anything that can be canned, stored, dried or frozen. There is still time to plant most vegetables and a possibility for all vegetables. I have seen the "blitz hands" on my father's farm in Missouri plant large fields of corn for the third time—after two crops had been washed down the river. They would choose a variety that matures more quickly, but they would still have a corn crop.

Take advantage in your stride, plant your vegetable garden when you can, protect your own family against the food shortage, and try to raise a little extra for others.

Enter the Victory Garden Contest. When you look at your garden now you think it could never be a prize garden, but remember that all the other entrants are contending with the same weather conditions. Your chances of winning recognition are just as good as they ever were.
