Garden Club Backs Clean-Up, Paint-Up

The Birmingham Branch of the National Women's Fair and Garden Association heartily approves of Clean-Up Week, being held in Birmingham, May 13 to 22, and Mrs. Arthur E. Ulrich, chairman of the Roadside Improvement Committee, "Clean-Up Week activities are essential war activities, contrary to the belief of some people. They take the homes and grounds of Birmingham neat and tidy as the boys dream they are—they might be worth fighting for." Cleaning and raking will bring to light many small bits of essential materials that are most likely forgotten," said Mrs. Ulrich. "There might be places where unscrupulous rubbish heaps provide feeding grounds and homes for rats. Rats are loathsome carriers of filth and uncleanness and must be eradicated. Rubbish heaps and uncovered garbage are also breeding places of flies."

This spring, "Clean-Up, Pick-Up and Paint-Up" is a definite part of the American war effort," Mrs. Ulrich stated. "Clean-Up Week means guaranteeing better health through improved sanitation. 'Pick Up' can mean valuable additions to the salvage project of cans, tin, rubber and all metals. 'Paint Up' means the preservation of equipment. Let everyone in Birmingham consider himself a committee of one to see that his home and yard are kept clean and that rubbish is hauled away! An important war activity will then have been initiated and ought to become a permanent program throughout the year."
