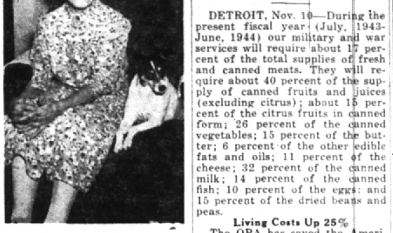

### Savings and Loan Ass'n's Made Fine War Loan Record

Washington, Nov. 10.—Savings and loan associations and other home-financing institutions of the Federal Home Loan Bank System more than doubled the goal originally set for them in the Third War Loan drive. Governor James T. Wooley of the Bank System announced today.

Sales of war bonds to the public and investment of their own funds will total \$600,000,000 during the period of the drive, which another \$100,000,000 will go to their credit on the Treasury's records as the result of war bond purchases by the Federal Savings and Loan Insurance Corporation, Mr. Wooley said.

"The performance of these institutions can be measured by the fact that their war bond sales and purchases in a month's time are equal to 11 1/2% of their total assets," he declared. "They contributed to the leadership of the Third War Loan in the 2,000 cities and towns they serve and a preliminary check indicates they far exceeded the quotas set for savings and loan associations in every state in the country."
