## S.A. Speaker Delights Farm And Garden Club Members

While Senora Vollemaere's topic, "Being South America" was centered on the growth and beauty of South American plants and its gardens where orchids and gardenias, banana trees, tobacco plants and hundreds of rare specimens give them a unique atmosphere and arrangement, she related many incidents which prove the worth of a good Neighbor policy as a benefit to both Americas.

Senora Vollemaere, a native of Uruguay, pictured South American women as conservative. They do not go into business or assume other responsibilities, as North American women do, but capably manage their homes and sew for their families, charity, their servants and for civic institutions. They devote much time to literature and music. "These women are not lacking in ambition or efficiency," she said, "but are descendants of the French, Italian and Spanish and keep to their traditions of women's place in the home and society."

The speaker also talked of the growth of the sunflower in South America as a background or fence and its use for many gardens and how the seeds are eaten and sold as our popular popcorn. She also discussed the vegetable bringing out the pumpkin as a food which is eaten almost every day in most homes and cooked along with many other vegetables in a dish comparable to our boiled dinner.

Senora Vollemaere brewed the popular South American drink before her audience, describing how it is done in a treated round and is passed as a loving cup. She spoke informally and possessed a wit which cleverly accented the interesting facts she presented to her listeners in an inimitable manner.
