Plan Campaign To Collect Old Clothing Here

Advancing Allied forces will liberate millions of homeless families, families in countries now under Axis domination. From scores of millions of these families are without sufficient food or clothing, and in order to aid in their relief, the Birmingham Salvage Committee is being carried on during the period from November 22 to December 4, inclusive. In this two week period, American housewives are asked to sort out all discarded clothing, suits, dresses, children's apparel, anything which their families will not use again, and turn them in to the churches and schools cooperating in this drive.

John W. Caputo, Chairman of the Birmingham Salvage Committee said, "Americans have had an opportunity of doing lately through pictures sent from Axis held countries, the ravages of misery and starvation which these people are undergoing. I know that women of America will respond wholeheartedly in this appeal for clothing for these people, turning in worn, outmoded clothing which their family does not use, which will mean untold comfort to others. That wool jacket, several sizes too small for you, that old overcoat which the moth's got into, almost every type of clothing can be used, and it's our job to supply those whose need is greater than anything we can imagine. Collections will be handled locally through the Birmingham Salvage Committee, with central depot located at 167 North Woodward avenue, where clothing may also be brought."

"Time is short and the need is great. This is a real challenge which America, which includes Birmingham and vicinity, must meet with an all-out effort," said Mr. Caputo.

A meeting of the members of War Production Board for the campaign will be held tonight at 7:30 o'clock in the Municipal Building. Detailed plans for the campaign will be made known.

Mr. Lyle Accepted Book

In accepting the Book on behalf of the MOMS Club, Mrs. Lyle, who herself lost her eldest son a few months ago in the Aleutians, responded beautifully to the occasion when she said:

"As a representative of the MOMS Club, and for every man, woman and child in this area, I am proud that standing by you is your loved one who is away—your son, your brother, my son, your husband, and you women who have gone from our midst to the far corners of the world to fight for the things we hold so dear—our democratic and neighborly way of life. How prone we are to take our blessings for granted. How easy it is to forget that privileges are bought with a price—until the menace of a world at war shatters our sense of security and it becomes necessary to send forth our best representatives to defend our principles.

"There are children among us whose fathers' names are in this book—wives with husbands, some who have both husbands and sons in uniform—parents with sons and daughters—young women with sweethearts—cousins, nephews, or friends, many of whom we have known from infancy. Each one of us has a stake in this book.

"I like to think of memorials as expressions of gratitude. A great sense of gratitude almost overcomes us when we think of what we owe to those whose names are in this book.

"Many times, when in Detroit and other large cities, I have stopped to examine the enormous monuments in stone and bronze which have been erected to perpetuate the memory of those heroes who participated in that great struggle of deeds which is known as our Civil War. Their names are not imprinted there, but looking at these monuments, one can visualize in his mind's eye regiments of soldiers, trooping forward to preserve the ideal of liberty and union. My grandfather was in the train—he died a young lad of twenty, leaving a young widow and an unborn son who was my father. Long since, the youngest soldier in that campaign has passed away—the lettering on the monument in Detroit is crumbling away—but their memory lives on.

"As we grow into a better understanding of the eternity of life, our expressions of gratitude assume a less material form. A single tomb of an unknown soldier in Arlington Cemetery expresses the gratitude of a nation. It seems very fitting that we should choose as our expression of gratitude—this beautiful book. Books are designed to perpetuate information. They have been preserved throughout the centuries, as they contain ideas. They are protected from wear and tear, put in clothed places and handled with loving care. In the sixteenth century, John Milton, the great English poet, described a good book as "the precious life blood of a master spirit, embalmed and treasured up on purpose to a life beyond life."
