"Papa Is All" Pleases Large Audience at Players' Opening

A restful change from sophisticated plays is provided in "Papa Is All," the comedy by Patterson Greene, which was presented last Friday and Saturday nights by the Village Players. The first night audience was amused and well pleased.

The plot concerns a typical Menomonee family in Lancaster County, Pa., which is dominated by a tyrannical father. When his son takes

steps to get rid of him during a family crisis, complications set in, but are straightened out by a kind-hearted state trooper. The Dutch dialect used afforded many laughs, and the liberal use of "yet," "yonder," "still," and "just," as is common in that section of the country, lent a realistic but humorous note to the play.

Exceptional Characterization
The setting was also typical of a Pennsylvania Dutch kitchen, with wooden sink and open cupboards, and it was a great surprise to see a coffee grinder used in one scene.

Peg Reid, as Anna Aukamp, played to perfection the part of the housewife who is oppressed and longed wistfully for some "conveniences." Franklin Fricker, as Papa, her husband, gave a splendid portrait of pure cussedness.

As Jake, their mechanical minded son, Bertie Ketchum was extremely convincing. His complete control of the dialect was a marvelous piece of acting. Norris Scott as their young daughter, Emma, supplied the youth and vitality necessary to such a role.

Betsy Linton had the part of Mrs. Yoder, a gossiping neighbor, and to it she brought a lively humor and an accent that kept the audience in stitches. Carl Neumann as State Trooper Brendle handled his role most skillfully.

The play was under the very capable direction of Ruth Hill and Mary Cobb was her able assistant.

Competent Committees
The scenic committee included Lane Bishop, Tom Adams, Rolfe Spinning, George Dweley, Dick Lewis, Long Baker, Herb Poppen, and Shirley Poppleton. The stage committee was comprised of Harold Middleton, Herb Poppen, Cy Lewis, and Bob Tillson. Dick Wenzel and Paul Averill were on the light committee. Clara Muhlman, Mae Averill, Marj Pardee and Maud Skinner did the makeup and hair. The costume committee included Dorothy Herdick, and Hildy John.

Seen at the Play
Simply put, the costume keynotes of the gathering, little black dresses getting the highest votes. The new hat hair-do also put in an appearance.

One of those who elected black was Ruth Hill, director of the play, who wore a simple dress with velvet collar, accented by a corsage of white carnations. Earrings in a bracelet of bright gold made the outfit. Another was Mrs. J. W. Bampton, whose only adornment was a single jeweled pin.

Mrs. Donald Stanton wore a stunning green floor-length suit fastened with bows. Jane Poppen was in black with gold mail corsage. Mrs. Reed Alexander chose pink wool which fastened down the front with small gold buttons.

Mrs. Inez Asper looked fetching in a bright red jacket. Teal blue was a complimentary color for Miss Olive Robinson's fair complexion. Mrs. Floyd Franklin was seen in a purple dress made to suit with gold buttons. Her small purple felt sailor had a veil with multi-colored dots. Mrs. L. B. Spappington also wore dark purple in a floor-length dress with beaded trim.

A black calot with fuchsia flowers caught my eye and a white teddy bear, crocheted on the shoulders and sleeves, looked good enough to eat. A conversation piece was a purple pillbox hat with sequins of a slightly darker shade.

Mrs. Charles Shain looked stunning in a dark blue floor length gown, with white lace inserts and cuffs. A two tone wool, in beige and coral also attracted much talk.
