On Sunday, Oct. 31, Osa Johnson, world famous woman explorer, will show motion pictures of "Tuzig and the Solomon Islands" and "African Paradise."

Michigan Sent 29,866 To Navy In 9 Months

A total of 29,866 men joined the Navy in lower Michigan during the first nine months of 1943, it was announced today by Lieut. Comdr. Byron E. Fletcher, Officer in Charge of Navy Recruiting and Induction in this area.

Of this number, 25,079 were inductees and 4,787 were volunteers, he said. The nine-month total exceeds the 25,729 men taken into the Navy in lower Michigan during all of 1942.

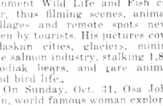
Misunderstanding Over Soldiers' Gift Boxes Cleared Up

To the Editor:
"Some questions have arisen concerning the Christmas boxes that Baldwin students have sent to alumni in the service who are overseas."
"We regret very much that we have been criticized by some people because boxes were not sent to all. As service chairman for the Girls' League, I would like to take this opportunity to explain further the method used in selecting the recipients of these packages."

"Each homeroom was entitled to make WAVES selections from the Memorial Honor Plaque in the high school. With a few exceptions all the names on the plaque are members of the homerooms because those boys or girls were close relatives of students in those homerooms. This method was suggested to us by the MOMS' Club."

"It is obvious that with 552 names on the Plaque (and many more ready to be added) and over 300 of these boys and girls overseas, it was impossible to send gifts to all although we should like to have remembered every Baldwin service man and woman."

"Thirty-one boxes have been sent from only 20 homerooms. Every student contributed most generously to the worthy cause. "We feel that it is advisable to bring this matter to the attention of Birmingham parents so that they will understand more clearly the way in which this project was carried out."
