 Urge Hunters to Sell Deer Hides  
 LANSING, Oct. 20.—The state conservation department today issued an urgent appeal to deer hunters to turn all deer hides obtained this season into commercial channels for the manufacture of military equipment. Only 20,000 hides in a kill of 62,000 were turned in a year ago.  
 Department officials reminded hunters that this year's deer can furnish much-needed gloves and mukluks (Arctic shoes) for our troops stationed in cold climates, as well as fill out the family meat ration.  
 Although revised federal regulations do permit that a deer skin may be processed for the owner's personal use or for a gift, hunters are urged to see that the greatest possible use is made of their wartime for deer by directing it into commercial channels so that it may be used for the armed forces.  
 After the hide is removed, it should be rubbed with salt and stretched, department game men declare. After the salted skin has dried out, it should be wrapped side out, in a small bundle and shipped immediately to a dealer or a tannery.  
 Permits to sell or ship deerhides may be obtained from any conservation officer, hunters are reminded. The department will also furnish hunters with the names of authorized fur dealers in Michigan to whom they may sell their hides at market prices.

 Mallender's statement was a reply to the many victory gardeners who have asked that plowing be delayed so that their root crops could be cured by the action of the frost. Mrs. Charles W.
