The speaker will be Miss Joyce M. Jopling, of Detroit, who will be introduced by the chairman, Mrs. Warren C. Pratt. Miss Jopling, who was born in Australia, has resided in Detroit for the last 15 years and is librarian of the Schools Department of the Detroit Public Library.

Members of the Birmingham Village Players and their guests will go to see their October presentation, "Papa Is All," by Patterson Greene, in a spruced up and refurbished setting Oct. 29 and 30. Linton, are given every opportunity to use the Pennsylvania dialect at its funniest. Papa Aukamp, villain of the piece, is played by Franklin Bricker. Mrs. Carleton Scott and Ericker Ketchum have the parts of daughter and son in the Aukamp family, and it is their problems with the older generation that constitute the plot of the show. Carl Neumann, as Policeman Brendle, is eventually called in to settle everyone's troubles.
