- Miss Ruth Kimball, executive secretary of the Oakland County Chapter of the American Red Cross, who is cooperating this year with the Birmingham-Bloomfield Branch of the Needlework Guild, has issued the following statement regarding the functions of Red Cross Home Service, the recipient of this year's In-gathering: "Red Cross Home Service applies to the service rendered by chapters in behalf of men and women in all branches of the military and naval service and their families; for disabled ex-service persons and their families. This service also applies to some few civilians who, for some reason may not be the responsibility of any other local agency.

The primary responsibility of Home Service is to assist service men and ex-service men and their families in meeting those needs which arise from the man's service in the armed forces.

The Local Chapter functions in many ways to carry out these responsibilities; it gives assistance to service men and their families with inquiries in regard to the welfare of their own; Family Service is an important part of Home Service in which Home Service volunteers assist and consult with families regarding their needs. Frequently the basic need is clothing as many times families for some reason have exhausted their own resources. The needs for clothing at this particular time are:

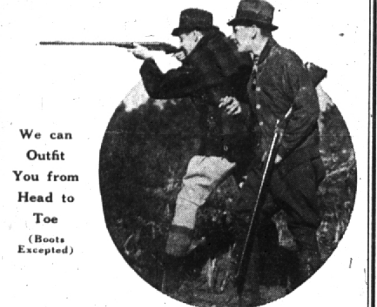
