

Historical Society to Urge Buying Of Wisner Home, Pontiac, As Museum

Purchase of the Governor Wisner home in Pontiac as a museum and patriotic shrine will be urged at the October meeting of the Oakland County Board of Supervisors by the Oakland County Pioneer and Historical Society and the Michigan State Historical Commission.

Governor Wisner served in 1859-61, leaving office during his term at President Lincoln's first call for volunteers in 1861, when the Civil War broke out, to raise a regiment which became the Twenty-Second Michigan Infantry. It was mainly composed of Oakland men. He took the regiment to Camp Wallace, Ky., in the Fall of 1862, for training. Later that winter he died of typhoid fever in Lexington, George N. Fuller, secretary of the State Historical Commission, has pointed out to J. W. Adams of Pontiac, president of the county historical society, that there are about 600 "house museums" in the United States, but that Michigan has only a very few, although historic houses that could be preserved are very numerous in the state. Marion, who is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Arthur Nevill Kirk of West Lincoln, will leave Washington for New York this week to continue her studies in ballet and the modern dance.
