(Continued from Page 1) ance requirements could not be relaxed without the result proving disastrous to the system as a whole. The Board also confirmed the appointment of three teachers and voted to accept the resignation of Mrs. Beulah Clark as a clerk. Authorization of all accounts payable was passed as well as the necessary action to award a contract. Supt. Ireland presented personnel which revealed that six teachers have gone into industry, two have retired, and five have married. Six have gone into the armed forces, two have returned to college, and nine were lost to other systems.

Next topic on the agenda was the contract with Great Western Greyhound Lines, Inc., which is the same as last year with one exception. One last year has been added. . . from Barnum to Pierce. Supt. Ireland stated that there had been considerable agitation for this new line, but that so far only 20 applications had been received for it. In order for the lines to be used, there must be a minimum of 50 passengers. The Board then authorized Ireland to take whatever steps he deemed necessary to complete the contract and recommended that an effort be made to obtain a 30 day cancellation clause for that particular run if developments prove that it will be self-supporting.

The 1943-44 athletic budget came up for discussion but it was decided to hold that over until the next meeting to give the Board an opportunity to examine it more fully. The total budget requested comes to slightly under \$2,500.

The opinion of the Supervisors July 13 a motion was passed to continue Diebel's salary, although it was argued that payment to Diebel might be questionable, but that no doubt the war emergency could be used to sustain the action. Mr. Merritt continued this argument before the three judges Tuesday.

In First Case In U. S. A. A telephone call to one of the three judges yesterday brought forth the statement that "we are meeting to go over the details of the case, and expect to reach an unanimous decision within a few days." It is believed that this is the first such case ever brought to the courts in the United States, and no other OPA rationing board chairman or member in the nation is known to receive remuneration from other than the federal government.

The opinion has been expressed in certain official quarters that, should Diebel's salary be continued through court approval, the rationing board chairmen in the county, and perhaps in other sections of Michigan, may also be entitled to the same consideration, if they wish.

Capt. T. R. Walton In New Mexico

News of the untimely death of Captain Thomas R. Walton, 50 years of age, whose passing occurred Monday afternoon at four o'clock in Albuquerque, New Mexico, was telegraphed to his family here at 691 Pilgrim avenue. The message stated that he had succumbed to an attack of acute indigestion. Captain Walton, a resident of Birmingham for 15 years, enlisted in the Army in April of 1942. Prior to his enlistment he had spent many years as a manufacturer's agent in Detroit.

He is survived by his widow, Mrs. Mabel M. Walton; a son, Thomas R. Jr., 25 years of age, who has been in the Aleutian Islands as a Technical Sergeant with the Air Force, and who has not been home for 22 months; two daughters, Mrs. Robert W. (Kathryn) Eiter, of Alford, La., and Miss Marjorie G. Walton, of Pilgrim road, and a grandson, Thomas R. Walton III. His mother, Mrs. Minnie Walton, of Detroit, also survives. Captain Walton had no living brothers or sisters.
