Flint Youth Crashes Car Here Driving 90

A wild, three-mile chase at over 90 miles an hour ended with one of the participants in the Bloomfield Hills jail last Saturday evening at 7 o'clock. The participants were Edward J. Bouchard, 19 years old, of 802 Leland, Flint, and Pauline Alva J. Richardson of the Bloomfield Hills Police Department. Richardson said that he was going between 90 and 95 miles an hour and was not gaining on the youth when the latter crashed into the safety island at Woodward and Hunter. The car rolled over eight or ten times, according to witnesses, and when the officer pulled up to the scene, young Bouchard was crawling out of the wreckage with only minor scratches to show for his crash.

Police said that he had "been drinking" and he was removed to a hospital before being taken to the jail. Monday morning officers said that Bouchard had admitted the car was stolen in Flint. On Monday a charge of reckless driving had been lodged against him, and authorities stated that there was a possibility of one for grand larceny being added.
