Many people have probably wondered how the newspapers get ideas for stories. This one originated right on our own classified ad page—a message which read: "Wanted old tuxedos or black woolen garments. Material to be used in rug making. 404 South Bates, across from Community House." That is how I happened to call on Mrs. Paul E. Heinsohn.

Mrs. Heinsohn had advertised for the tuxedos because she needed new materials for a braided rug she is making for her dining room. She said, "I couldn't see myself buying brand new materials when I knew there undoubtedly were several old tuxedos, discarded in the back of closets, just waiting for a visit from the moth."

Home Done Over

Although Mrs. Heinsohn's rug is gorgeous, examples of many many hours of hard work, her lovely home is a story in itself. Mr. and Mrs. Heinsohn have re-

habilitated the house, which until about four and a half years ago, stood all boarded-up and run-down on the south side across the street from the Community House. The house is over 85 years old.

"I used to tell people that I live in the dirtiest, most disreputable house in town," Mrs. Heinsohn declared. Now it is one of Birmingham's loveliest, with its original old lines, high-ceilinged rooms, and beautiful white pine floors. After they removed several coats of paint from the floors they discovered that they were a beautiful mahogany which they cleaned up and they shranked them with the clear varnish they turned an odd red which makes them appear to be cedar. It is these floors that are so charmingly bedecked with Mrs. Heinsohn's rugs. She has one rug 10 1/2 feet by 11 1/2 feet which is used in her sitting room. The rug is braided in black, grey, red and green.

The furnishings throughout the house are in keeping with the old fashioned type of home. Her son Paul's room is furnished with the furniture his grandparents had in their bedroom suite.

Don't Pump Organ

There is an old organ which stands in the dining room. Paul and Mrs. Heinsohn have made it into an electrically-run organ. They connected it with an old vacuum cleaner in the basement; the vacuum furnishes the air and, therefore, the old organ, which has been in the family for years, is now electric.

Out in the yard the Heinsohns have built what looks to be an old well but in reality it's a modern picnic grill.

Mrs. Heinsohn is what she terms "a true homemaker." She is also a very fine needlewoman, and has made many unique and attractive things, as well as practical things. One of her most amazing creations is a grey fur cape which she knit out of imported French angora. The cape very greatly resembles a grey squirrel cape. Another work of art which she knit is a brown, three-quarter length coat, that looks very similar to a brown karakul coat.

Mrs. Heinsohn is originally from Lakewood, O., however, up until almost five years ago, she has lived in Semole Hills, Pontiac.

Although Mrs. Heinsohn's rugs were not a story in themselves, her lovely old home is more than enough material for several stories.
