Southfield Seeks School Annexation

Birmingham's present school district may be enlarged to include two small school areas in Southfield Township, if all electors concerned express their approval before December 31, at special elections that will be called. This was seen in the action Tuesday night of the Birmingham Board of Education in passing resolutions approving the annexation, subject to official acceptance by the voters.

The area under consideration is bounded approximately by the 14-Mile road on the north, a half mile west of Lahser road on the west, south approximately to the 12 1/2-Mile road, and east to Greenfield road. Districts included are Southfield No. 3 Fractional, and Southfield No. 1.

Due to the population growth of the entire Southfield Township in its southern portions, the need for a system of Township schools exists; however, since the northern area, contiguous to Birmingham, send their children to Birmingham schools now and feel themselves a part of the community, they have expressed themselves as desiring to be annexed to the Birmingham school district.

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tion Eugene Elliott and County School Commissioner E. J. Leberle both have looked with favor upon the annexation plan. Assessed valuations in the proposed areas total \$1,400,000.

The two Southfield districts first will vote on the project and, if approved, Birmingham's district will call a special election for the same purpose, all of which must be done before December 31.
