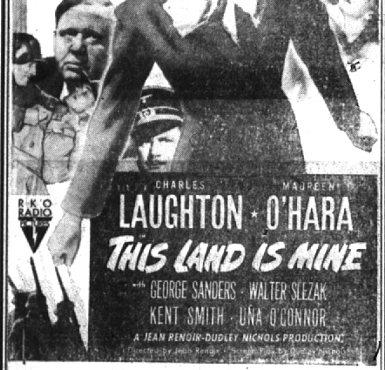
HOME ON LEAVE

65% of Shipments Is Gasoline, Oil

The rapid advance of Lt. Gen. Patton's highly mechanized Seventh Army on Sicily was due in large measure to the simplicity of his fuel supply.

A report received today by Col. Ray, in command of the Army's commanding officer, revealed that the Seventh Army used only one type of gasoline tanks, jeeps, amphibian trucks, armored cars, self-propelled artillery, tractors, motorcycles, ambulances, and ammunition carriers.
The gas tanks of all combat vehicles were filled in North Africa. But this original supply didn't last long. Each mechanized division required 18,000 gallons of gasoline for every hour it was on the move. As a consequence, it was necessary to transport additional gasoline in thousands of five-gallon containers. These were landed or floated ashore at various points along the southern Sicilian coast. If the various types of combat vehicles had required special types of gasoline, the American advance would have been enormously complicated.

The gas tanks of all overseas shipments to our troops—and this adds to 600 tons a day for the American division—consist of petroleum products. So important is the fuel problem that for more than three years Army Ordnance has been conducting exhaustive experiments with fuels and lubricants under climatic conditions. Supply simplification is one of the primary objectives of this planning and development work. Predictable foreign sources have already paid rich dividends in North Africa, Sicily and the Southwest Pacific.

African Products in Display at Cranbrook

"The African Negro Products" is the title of a new exhibit at the Cranbrook Institute of Science showing characteristic crafts of the negro people living south of the Sahara Desert.

Most of the crafts on display are contemporary products, but some date back approximately one hundred years.
There is an interesting array of wooden masks and human figures, chiefly from the Belgian Congo. Brass weights used on scales for weighing gold dust in the gold coast region indicate the high level reached by African negroes in the working of gold, copper and brass.

Included in the current display are specimens from the Robert H. Cozzens collection, the Frederick Stearns collection, and from specimens deposited by Mr. Paul Litzner, Mrs. Hugh Aughey, and Mrs. Wilson W. Mills. Stearns and Mrs. Mills are Detroiters.

The exhibit will be on display for the next two months.
