It is anticipated that the money taken in from the sale of these plants will go to buy Christmas gifts for the boys in the service.

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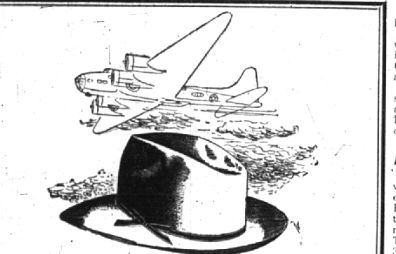
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
