The idea has been adopted by the people of Virginia, Minnesota, a municipality of 12,264 souls. Virginia is said to be the first and only community in the courtry where a central heating system, provides such said to be the first and only community in the courtry where a central heating system, provides such heat for all the homes, stores, shoothy and churches in the city.

The muneipally-owned heating system, operated as a non-profit enterprise, burns 43,960 tons of bituninous coal a year at \$7 a ton, according to information to the International City Managers Association. If Virginia householders—the community has a population of 12,264—toked their own furnaces, they would consume approximately 40,000 tons of anthracite—at \$17 a ton—anually, city officials say.

The average householder in a five-room house in the city pays \$70 a year to have his house and water heated, about half of what it would cost on an individual basis. In addiit would cost on an individual basis. In addi-tion, the community and its residents profit through an auxiliary use of the central heat-ing plant, since the steam is first used to gen-erate the electricity the town uses before it is piped into homes and business establish-ments.

Every street in town has a steam main, and Every street in town has a steam main, and a master thermostat controls the temperature in the individual houses. After the steam has done its heating job it drops through waste pipes as water to be weighed and recorded by a special meter before it is discharged into the sewer,

The one central heating plant has made the The one central seating piant has made the city virtually smokeles, resulting in lower cleaning bills, fewer colds, less laundry and better morale for citizens. There are no ash cans, climinating some refuse collection problems for the city, dwelling fires are down 40 per cent and Virginia's store owners receive 5 per cent "protective credit" on their insurance premiums.
