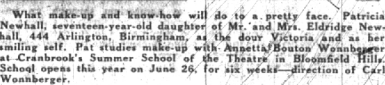
Community House Adds Youth Night
The Community House this week is adding another to the long list that is being rendered to Birmingham for many years. The new feature is a "Youth Evening for Young People" which has been under study for some time. It was announced that this feature will be started on Friday evening, April 14, for young folk of high school age—students of the tenth, eleventh, and twelfth grades and for service men who are under 20 years of age.
There will be games, including ping pong, billiard, cribbage, bridge and other amusements and dancing, with an interesting program of entertainment planned. Admission is to be 10 cents per person, with service men being invited to attend without cost.
The place will be known as the "Teen Canteen" and there will be a canteen where soft drinks and sandwiches will be served.
In charge for the Community House will be Mrs. Hugh D. McLoose and T. Hollister Makley, co-chairmen of youth activities, and a student committee made up of Polly Hanson, general chairman; Charles Smith, Fred Mason, program and equipment; Phyllis Jones, sponsor; and Max Corneli, house.
About the plan Lloyd G. Chapman, high school counselor, says: "This is a very fine idea and a step in the right direction. It needs and deserves the support of every Baldwin student because this is a yardstick by which other organizations will measure desires for a youth center."
