Ten Birmingham And Bloomfield Women To Become Nurses' Aides

On Thursday, April 20, at 8 p. m. graduation exercises for the tenth American Red Cross Volunteer Nurses' Aide class will be held in the auditorium of St. Joseph's Mercy Hospital. George R. Averill will address the graduates.

Nurses' Aides have to date given more than forty thousand hours of volunteer service to the hospitals of Oakland county. This has meant sacrifices of personal interests by those giving their time but, the Aides, "The friendliness and appreciation of both the hospital staffs and the patients have more than repaid any effort we may have made."

One hundred and fourteen Aides have given 150 hours, 25 have given 504 hours and one more than one thousand hours of volunteer service since the first class graduated in May, 1942.
