### Lumber Baron Is Taken By Death

Funeral services for Willis C. Ward, who died Monday at his home on Old Orchard trail, Orchard Lake, will be held at 2:30 today at this address from the family residence. The Rev. William Hamm, of St. Joseph Episcopal church, Detroit, will conduct the services.

Death came after a brief illness although Mr. Ward had been in failing health for several months.

He was the son of the late David Ward, who was one of the early surveyors and lumbermen who amassed a fortune in the pine lands of the northern part of the state. The son also had devoted much of his life to lumbering.

Mr. Ward was born in Saginaw Aug. 15, 1862, and with his parents, David and Mrs. Elizabeth Perkins Ward, moved to Orchard Lake in February, 1862.

From 1881 until the death of his father in 1900, Mr. Ward engaged in logging pine timber on the head waters of the Manistee river and in the manufacture of pine lumber in Manistee. Between 1900 and 1912 he was engaged in the logging of the estate of David Ward. He managed the logging of the last grove of 400 million feet, most of it into lumber, at DeWard in Crawford county. He operated a large sawmill and lumber yard there and some 60 miles of railroad, and died on Oct. 19, 1942, at Lake Michigan at East Jordan.

Most of the lumber was shipped by vessel to Tonawanda and Buffalo, N. Y.

Surviving are two children: Harold Lee Ward, 142 Ottawa drive, and Mrs. Marie Strong, Orchard Lake. He is also survived by a sister, Mrs. Perle Root, New York City, and by several grandchildren and two great-grandchildren. His wife, Mrs. Mable Lee Ward, died in 1916.

Burial was at 9 a.m. Wednesday at Holy Name with burial in Holy Sepulchre cemetery.
