## Local Workers For Seeing-Eye Drive Hear Morris Frank

Blind people do not need pity but do need to be included with the determination to lead an active, normal life in spite of blindness, according to Morris Frank, vice president of The Seeing Eye, who addressed workers of the annual Detroit Seeing Eye Membership Enrollment at the Community House on Monday.

Mrs. M. Romayne Thompson, chairman of the Birmingham-Bloomfield Hills Division of the enrollment, which opens on May 1, Mrs. Randall Ballantyne was chairman of the Monday meeting.

"A person suddenly deprived of sight," said Mr. Frank, "needs to realize that he can perform the normal activities of life such as dressing, shaving, and eating. Encouraged to be receptive to these simple but important lessons he is then ready for the broader philosophy that with the ability to get about alone, he can take his place along with sighted people in an everyday world."

In order to assist in preparations for the Detroit Enrollment, Mr. Frank has interrupted a nationwide tour of Army, Navy and Veterans Administration Hospitals. The purpose of his tour, which is being made in cooperation with the Surgeon General of the Army and the Bureau of Medicine and of the Navy Department, is to acquaint the personnel of government hospitals with the Seeing Eye's approach to the adjustment of the newly blinded. It supplements the Seeing Eye's resolution of December 8, 1941, to supply dog guides to all eligible members of the armed forces who may become blinded in line of duty, without cost to them or to the government.

A second meeting for workers in this area is planned for Friday, April 28, at the Community House at 2 P. M.
