

County Will Get More Help With War Food Effort

Oakland county's war food program will receive further assistance as a result of an announcement made this morning by Karl D. Bailey, county agricultural agent.

Mrs. Isabel Grunau, of Clawson, has been appointed to the position of War Food Assistant, as a result of action taken by the State Board of Agriculture.

Mrs. Grunau will be associated with the Extension Office and will work on victory gardening and other war food programs. Mrs. Grunau was born in Michigan and grew up on a farm in Jackson county. She is horticulture graduate of the University of Illinois, and on the faculty staff of the university later. She is also associated with the School of Horticulture for Women at Amherst, Pa.

Mrs. Grunau has served during the past two years as vice-chairman of the Victory Garden Committee, and is now president of the Garden Center for southern Oakland county.

The war food program is promoted by several federal government agencies in the county, including the Extension Service of which Mr. Bailey is the county agent, and Mrs. Mary W. Allen, county home extension agent. It is promoted also by the teachers of the county, who are serving as volunteer chairmen of committees. The work is already under way for 1944 with every community in the county. The volunteer chairman and committee lists are as follows:
