

Three Cranbrook Weavers Honored

Robert Sailor, a graduate fellowships student at the Cranbrook Academy of Art, Bloomfield Hills, has been awarded first-prize in the First Annual International Textile Exhibition held last month at Greensboro, North Carolina.

Informing the patterns of Mr. Sailor's exhibit of weavings won high praise from the jury.

Marianne Streng, Dusenbury with Robert Sailor, first place and with another entry, Patricia Patton of Bel Air, Maryland, for second honors. Mrs. Dusenbury is head of the Weaving and Textile Department at the Cranbrook Academy of Art.

For the first time in history textile designers were offered the opportunity to show their work and to compare it with other contemporary creations. Approximately 200 entries were judged from leading free lancers and commercial designers. Entries included rugs, tunics, upholstery, drapery and tapestry materials among the woven textiles. The printed group consisted largely of draperies, dress materials and accessories.
