Need More Than Lip Service

"We women in the Birmingham area are doing everything we can to make this coming blood bank a success—but we need more practical help from others to prove to our fighting men that we are giving more than mere lip service to those who are away from us yesterday." At least 650 people should register to give a pint of blood at a park site about 40 by 300 feet in size and would be intended as a neighborhood play place for the city. The estimated cost is \$5,700.
